A RELIGIOUS REVIVAL.—The protracted meeting in the M. E. Church in this place, (which was in progress for about four weeks,) was brought to a close on Sunday evening last. During its progress a great many persons professed conversion, and a goodly number were added to the church. FIRE.—We have been informed that the large dwelling house and store of Mr. Thos. Groom, and the adjoining building, in Glen Hope, were destroyed by fire on the morning of the 23d of February. The fire was first discovered about three o'clock, but had already made such headway that it was impossible to save the buildings. Part of the goods and furniture were saved. The building adjoining the store, was occupied by Miss E. A. Wright as a milliner Store and post office, but it is not stated whether she sustained any loss. The loss is considerable, and we presume there was no insurance thereon.

A BREAK UP IN THE RIVER.—During the latter part of last week, the weather was quite mild, and soon the river began to rise from the melting of the snow. On Saturday night, about 11 o'clock, the ice commenced to break up, and by Sunday morning the river was clear for some miles above and below this place. We understand that a large amount of timber was carried away by the ice all along the river—in one instance, some 12 or 15 rafts in one lot. On Sunday morning, however, the air was somewhat colder, and in the afternoon hard freezing set in and stopped the flow of water into the streams—otherwise the loss would have been much greater. Yet, as it is, much lumber has been swept away—the loss of which will be seriously felt by many persons.
