THE CASE OF REV. LINDSAY. -- A COTTESpondent of the Buffalo Express states that Rev. Mr. Lindsay was arraigned before the Supreme Court at Albion on the 27th ult., on a charge of manslaughter, and plead not guilty. Lindsay was arrested for whipping his own child, a boy about three years of age, to death. He was released on \$12,000 bail, given by his father and brothers, and his case referred to this term of the Court. At the request of the District Attorney the case was put over to the January Term. Lindsay is described as a man rather below the medium size, about thirty-five years of only in the way of duty.
