He refused selling at the price, and several days thereafter he had an offer of fifteen hundred dollars for them, but did not sell-a price which les in our opinion, should have taken. There seems to be a spirit of speculation abroad in Clearfield, which should not exist. Town lots, at the prices referred to, are entirely above their value, and if the prevailing speculative mania is persisted in it will do immense damage to the future business prosperity of our town, in that it will drive people to seek places for investment elsewhere, instead of drawing them hither. We hope that all property owners will give this matter their serious consideration, and that they will so act as to induce the building up of the town of Clearfield, and thus aid in advancing its business interests generally. To LAND OWNERS .- It seems there are wayy land titles in this State in an imperfeet condition, which the State authorities intend to have perfected at an early day. Some of these lands have been patented, but the fees having never been paid thereon the State holds a lien against them, whilst in titles, a bill has been introduced into the State Senate and will become a law, directing the entry of liens for all money due on lands, etc. The bill provides that the Surveyor General shall calculate the amounts due on unpatented lands with interest from date of application or improvement, which shall be entered together with office fees, in a Commonwealth land lien docket, county duplicates of which shall be furnished to prothonotaries, and such aggregates shall be a lien against delinquents, carrying interest of six per cent., from date of entry; and when no return of survey has been made, if such return is not made by the 30th of November, 1868, the land to be forfeited to the Commonwealth, and any party may make application for the same, and enter, if the survey is accepted, and it is made the duty of the Surveyor General to accept such latter survey. Some six millions of dollars are due the State from this source. Now, bo doubt there are lands in Clearfield coun-W, that are subject to these State liens, on account of imperfect titles. Where these lands lie, or in whose names the warrants were issued, or who are the present owners, 15 not known. Therefore, it behooves all owners of lands, with as little delay as possible, to have a thorough investigation made into the character of the titles under which they hold-otherwise they may lose their lands.
