JUGGED INSTEAD OF MARRIED.—A rather amusing episode in real life occurred in this county last week. Some months since a man named Kauffman, a saddler by trade, came to Curwensville and obtained work. In the course of time he made the acquaintance of a young lady a few miles from town, to whom he made love, proposed and was accepted, and had the day fixed for the nuptials. But, as "the course of love does not always run smooth," so in this instance it met with an interruption. On the day, in the evening of which the wedding was to come off, the father of the young lady, who was averse to the marriage, was informed that his intended son-in-law was already married, and that his wife was living in the neighboring county of Blair. The father at once sought legal advice, and as Kauffman had obtained some money from the daughter for the purpose of purchasing some "fixins" for her, but which never came to hand, had a warrant issued for the arrest of the lover for obtaining money under false pretenses.
