To those who have lost both feet, or are totally disabled in the same, so as to require constant attendance, \$30 00 3. To those who have lost one hand or one foot, or so disabled as to render them unable to perform manual labor equivalent to the loss of a hand or foot, the sum, per month, of \$15 00 4. Persons deprived of their pensions under Act of March 3d, 1865, by reason of being in civil service are receiving the same. 5. The heirs of invalid pensioners who died after application for their pension had been filed and before the certificate was issued, and who have left widows or minor children, will be entitled to receive arrears due at the death of the pensioner. 6. Pensions are extended to dependent fathers and brothers, the same as to mothers and sisters. In all of these cases, new applications must be made.
