A STRANGE OCCURRENCE. - A correspondent, of Cameron, West Virginia. sends the following to the Waynesburg, Pa., Re publican : "A very singular occurrence took place in our neighborhood (the western part of Alleppo township) one night last summer, some notice of which may be interesting to your readers. Some time in the night refered to, a terribly loud explosion was heard by Mr. Griffith, Sr., living on the road leading from the place of elections for Alleppo township, to Cameron. Mr. Griffith describes the report as equaling in violence that of the heaviest artillery, being sufficient to shake his house very sensibly. Soon after this noise was heard, a large stump with an immense mass of stone and earth attached, was found sitting on top of the grass, in a field of Mr. Long, near by and in full view of the public road. The hole was filled with water to within two feet of the top. The stump had been thrown up the hill this considerable distance, together with a log about fifteen feet long which was lying across the roots.
