
IMPORTANT TO PENSIONERS .- The Act of Congress approved June 6, 1866, gives additional pension to the following class of

persons: 1. To those who have lost both eyes or both hards, or are totally disabled in the same so as to require constant attendance, the sum. per menth. of \$25.00 month. of \$25.60 2. To those who have lost both feet, or are to-tally disabled in the same, so as to require con-

stant attendance, \$20 00 3. To those who have lost one hand or one foot, or so disabled as to render them unable to perform manual labor equivalent to the loss of a hand or foot, the sum, per month, of \$15.00 4. Persons deprived of their pensions under Act of March 3d, 1865, by reason of being in civil service are restored.

5. The heirs of invalid pensioners who died after application for their pension had been fied, and before the certificate was issued, and who have left widows or minor children, will be entithed to receive arrears due at the death of the pensioner.
