Upon examination, Beard saw that the ball had taken effect a few inches below the elbow, and, going through the arm, had cut two holes in Smith's coat, over the breast pocket-thus narrowly escaping instant death. As soon as a conveyance could be obtained, the wounded man was brought to this place, and a surgeon summoned to dress his wound -when it was found that one bone was much -hattered, and the main artery severed, and that amputation likely would have to be resorted to, to save life. So far, however, the injured man has got along quite well, although the arm was much inflamed for several days; and it is to be hoped that the arm need not be taken off, but circumstances may Ist make such an event necessary.


