TO SCOUR KNIVES.—A correspondent of the Country Gentleman says: "A small, clean, potatoe, with the end cut off, is a very convenient medium of applying brick dust to knives, keeping it about the right moisture, while the juice of the potato assists in removing stains from the surface. We can get a better polish by this method than by any other we have tried, and with less labor."
