THE ROADS .- Owing to the large quantity of snow that has fallen within the last twelve days, and the action of the winds in drifting the same, many of the roads are impassable at this time. A few days, however, will suffice to make them in good travelling condition again.

THE TIMBER BUSINESS.-The depth of snow pervading this region, will, for a time at least, stop timber operations altogether. In our opinion, this is a very fortunate occurrence; for, had the season continued favorable, both for making and hauling timher, we believe the quantity produced would have been in excess of the demand, and, as a consequence, the price been so low as to cause very serious losses to those who could least bear them-the makers and small dealers. In fact, we believe, if there is not another stick cut or hauled this season, the timnow on the banks of the streams will bring more money than if the quantity is increased one-fourth or one-third. We throw out these hints for the consideration of those most interested. Will they heed them?
