The Eight Hour Law. Below we publish the law which proposes o make eight hours a legal day's work in to make eight hours a legal day's work in Pennsylvania, on and after the first day of July instant:

SEC. 1. Be it enacted etc., That on and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty eight, eight hours of labor between the rising and setting of the sun, shall be deemed and held to be a legal day's work, in all cases of labor and service by the day where there is no contract or agreement to

the contrary. SEC. 2. This act shall not apply to or in any way affect farm or agricultural labor or service by the year, month or week; nor shall any person be prevented, by anything berein contained, from working as many hours over time, or extra work, as he or she may see fit, the compensation must be agreed upon between the employer and the employce. SEC. 3. All other acts or parts of acts re-

lating to the hours of labor which shall constitute a day's work in this State, are hereby repealed.
