Wheat after Potatoes.

A correspondent writing from Missouri, to the editor of the Germantown Telegraph says:

Some of thy readers are now gathering their potato crop, and preparing the ground to be seeded down with wheat ; this preparing is often hastily done and much neg lected. May a word to such be in time. Many farmers think that because the ground was heavily manured for the potatoes, that it cannot fail to bring a crop of wheat. But training of the youth placed under his charge. many are sadly disappointed. The seed is so badly put in that a portion of it fails to grow; and the weeds spring up and choke Arithmetic, per session, (11 weeks.) out what does grow; and this being consequently weak and thin, is the prey of the fly, weevil, &c., so that the harvest brings a Surveying. But as far as my observation and experience reach, as good wheat can be raised after potatoes as anything else, simply by first putting the ground in good order, (of course a little manure is needful for wheat, sow it where you may.)

If farmers would spend more time in preparing their potato patches for wheat, they JP WEAVER would be abundantly repaid for it at harvest. I have frequently seen wheat sown after the ground had only been plowed to get the potatoes which are left after the digging is done, when if the ground had a second plowing, a very great difference in the wheat would have been realized.

I would say to those who cannot obtain good wheat after potatoes, to try giving the ground a second plowing; they will find that the ground will be in much better order and the yield nearer their expectations.

FATTENING POULTRY. - The London Field states that poultry, properly fed, will acquire all the fatness, needful for marketing purposes, in a fortnight or three weeks at most. Their diet should be Indian, out or bar ey meal, scalded in milk or water-the former their line of business, such as is the best, as it will expedite the fattening process. They should be fed early in the morning, at noon, and also in the evening Sash, Doors, Blinds, Brackets, and just before going to roost. A plentiful supply of pure fresh water-plenty of gravel. sliced cabbage or turnip tops. If the fowls are required to be very fat some trimmingof mutton suet may be chopped up and scalded with their other feed, or they may inch pannel plank preferred _ [Nov 6. 67. be boiled in milk alone and poured over the meal. This renders the flesh firmer than it otherwise would be. When fit to kill, feed ing should be stopped for twelve hours or more, that the intestines may become comparatively empty.

TOMATOES FOR WINTER USE.-After skinning perfectly ripe tomatoes, cut out any green around the base. I think leaving in this hard green core is the immediate cause of the loss of the truit. Place them in a bell-metal kettle over the fire ; season with salt as if for immediate use; then only allow them to come to a boil; while hot put in stone cans or small mouthed gallon jars, cork
