LEONCE'S MILL, Sept. 14th, 1868. Ed. JOURNAL.—The Republicans of Girard township, assembled at "Congress Hill" School house, on Friday evening, Sept. 11th, as per previous notice. It was the largest and most enthusiastic meeting ever held in the township. The meeting was organized by electing Thos. Leonard, Esq., President; John Spackman, Mitchell Shope, John R. Carr, and Simon Jary, Vice Presidents; and A. L. Hoover, Secretary.

Capt. A. B. Hutchison was then called on to address the meeting, and I presume, he spoke plainly enough on the subjects of taxation, reconstruction, etc., for our Democratic friends, who were present, to fully comprehend the questions, if they had a desire so to do.

THE WAY IT OPERATES.—During the war every rebel victory sent up the price of gold, and every Union victory caused it to fall. After the nomination of Grant gold advanced, and Government securities advanced. When the Democratic Convention met gold sold for 140. As soon as Seymour was nominated it rose to 142; as soon as his letter of acceptance was published it rose to 149.

Since the Vermont and Maine elections gold has declined, and stands at about 144, and Government securities have made a handsome advance. Let the people ponder these facts!
