The Statistics of the Lutheran Church, Prof. Stoever furnishes us with the following tables of the statistics of the Lutheran Church, in the January number of the Ecangelical Review. We gave our readers the aggregate number of Lutherans in the United States and Canada last week, and now subjoin the details, together with the number of Lutherans in the world.

LUTHERANS IN THE WORLD .- The population of the world is estimated at thirteen hundred millions of souls. Three hundred and thirty-five millions of these are nominally Christians. These are again divided into one hundred and seventy millions Roman Catholic, eighty millions Protestants,

and seventy-six millions Greek Catholics. Of the eighty millions of Protestants in the world, more than one-half are Lutherans. They are distributed very nearly as

These statistics have been compiled from different sources, but principally from the tabular statements, furnished by C. F. Deitterich, of Berlin, Director of the Statistical Department.

These statistics show that the Lutheran Church in the world is larger than all the other Protestant Churches combined; that even in the United States she is numerically the third denomination, numbering more communicants than any other Church, except the Methodist and Baptist; and rhat the ratio of her increase in this country has been very great. In 1820, when the General Synod was formed, there were but 103 ministers in the Lutheran Church in the United States: in 1823, 175 ministers and 900 congregations; in 1833, 337 ministers and 1,017 congregations; in 1843, 430 ministers and 1,371 congregations; in 1853, 900 ministers and 1,750 congregations; in 1863. 1,365 ministers and 2,487 congregation; in 1869 more than 2,000 ministers, about 3,500 congregations, and nearly 400,000 communicants. - Lutheran Observer.
