Pennsylvania Railroad.

The twenty-second annual report of the share-holders of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company shows another year of prosperous business upon this great line.

The total earnings were \$17,233,497 71. Of this amount \$3,541,903 94 were received from passengers, and \$778,244 29 from emigrant passengers. Mails, \$99,981 21; gen eral freights, \$12,882,165 39, and miscellaneous sources, \$349,321 32.

The total expenses were \$11,860,983 88. leaving the net earnings for the year 1868 \$5,372,513 43. The increase over the total revenues of 1867 is \$893,246 95. There was a decrease in the revenue from

emigrant travel, express matter and miscelaneous sources, amounting to \$209.729 58. The increase from regular freights, first class passengers and mail matter was \$1,100, 070 50.

The gross revenues for 1868 are equal to \$48,138, 26 per mile, of the main line of the railroad

The whole number of passengers carried in 1867 was 3,347,466, and in 1868, 3,747,178—an increase of the number carried of 398,712. The average distance traveled by each passenger was 35 54-100 miles, being 2 27-100 miles less than in 1867, showing this increase to be upon the local traffic of the line.
