for the farmer.

Straw for Horses.

The value of straw as a feeding substance was never better proved than by the following fact: A firm having a large number of heavy wagon horses, had frequent occasion for the verterinary surgeon, until they were recommended to mix a certain portion of fine cut straw with the clover hav. This has been practiced now for some years, and their bill for horse-doctoring is at a minimum. The partner of the firm who told me this, said how advantageous it was not to be deprived, as they formerly were, of the use of several horses-to say nothing of the saving in expense and loss. The fact is, the food was too rich or too mucilaginous, for I have often been told that fine cut hay, unmixed with straw chaff, balls in the stomach, and thus is, I suppose deprived of the notion of the gastric juices. We know that too succulent or rich grasses are injurious, and no doubt straw chaff mixed with it acts mechanically, if not chemically, with advantage. It would be well for our agricultural friends to know that for several thousand horses belonging to the London General Omnibus Company, the food is all passed through the chaff cutter with, I believe, a from New York and Philadelphia, we can offer certain proportion of straw. While spring grazing our bullocks on tares, we mix straw with them in their early growth, but as they advance to flowering and podding, this is not required, because there is much wheat and oats grown with this, which gets intermixed on passing through the chaff machine.

THE SECRET OF CHEAP PORK .- "What is the secret of making pork economically? Mine always costs me more than I can buy it for "There are several of these secrets known to the initiated. You may stuff any of the land pikes with any quantity of corn, and he will not fatien. Suffolks, Chester Whites, or grades of any pure breed, will show their keeping. Second. Good housing. A pig wants a nice, clean, dry pen to sleep in. The yard may have muck and plenty of litter for manure making, but the pen, or sleeping apartment, should be warm and well strawed. Third. Early fattening. Pork is made more economically in warm weather than cold. Fourth. A variety of food. If cooked indian meal is the staple, let it be varied with green food while it lasts, corn stalks, weeds, pursiane, and clover, and in winter feed enough cabbage and roots to keep the bowels in good condition. Fifth. Regular feeding, three times a day A fattening pig should never squeal, and he will not if he always finds his food ready at the regular time. Calculate to have your pork worth no more and perhaps a lit tle less than the feed costs, and look for all your profits in the grand heap of manure which the dying porker leaves as a legacy. These secrets make cheap pork in our pen, even at the present price of corn .-American Agriculturist.

PARAFINE WAX. - A correspondent from practical experience, recommends lard and parafine wax as the base of ointments used to dress running sores. It is stated that beeswax, the usual ingredient for giving consistency to the ointment, is melted by the heat of the body, and permits the humors to be absorbed by the linen bandages, which, therefore, in drying adhere to the wound and cause great pain. Trouble of this kind, it is asserted, is entirely obviated by the use of paratine wax. It may also be mentioned here, that a mixture of from one to three parts of coal tar with one hundred parts of fine plaster of Paris, well rubbed together and applied on lint, or used in a cataplasm, has a healing effect upon sores. and corrects the disagreeable odors from the suppurating surface.

POTATOES. -Plant in good soil : if it be rich, fresh manure will cause the crop to rot more or less. If the soil be poor, a lack of manure will often produce the same effect by lack of vigor in the plants to resist disease. It is best to plant as soon as the soil is warm. cutting the seed into pieces of two or three eyes and letting them dry a little before planting. Plant deep under light ridges, so that the field may be harrowed. The sets may be cut smaller later in the season.

Grass and Clover may be sown on any land which is suitably prepared for them. upon winter or spring grain, on old sod har rowed well, or by themselves. It is better to brush or bush in grass and clover seed than to roll the land. The plan of sowing a little white clover with grass-seed is advis able wherever an application of plaster will not bring it in abundantly, as it generally will on old land.

For Curs.-It is not generally known that the leaves of the geranium are an excellent application for cuts, where the skin is rubbed off, and other wounds of that kind. One or two leaves must be bruised and applied to the part, and the wound will be cicatrized in a short time.

To CUBE A DOG OF SHEEP KILLING .-Let him see the sheep he has killed; in his presence take off the pelt, fasten it tightly around him and make him wear it from one to three days. We think you will never be troubled by his meddling with sheep again.
