PASTE - The following is a receipt for making common paste, which will keep for a long time without fermentation. Dissolve an ounce of alum in a quart of warm water, when add as much flour as will give it the consistency of cream, then strain into a much powdered rosin as will lie on a shilling and two or three cloves, ground. It will keep for a year, and when dry may be softened with water.
