GREASE YOUR WHEELS.—"Some persons may not be aware," says Hieover in his work, Biped and Quadruped, "that the trifling neglect of a pair of wheels being comparatively dry or well greased will cause twenty miles to take far more work out of a horse than forty would in the latter case; yet wheels absolutely screaming from dryness are often seen and heard attached to carts and wagons; and thus would the brute in human form let them scream till he had finished his journey's end or his day's work, though his horse were drawing, from such cause, at least one ton more than if the defect were attended to."

POTATO YEAST.—Boil eight potatoes, mash them fine; add to them a pint of sifted flour, two table-spoonfuls of brown sugar, half a teaspoonful of salt, three pints of boiling water. When cold, add a teacup full of hop yeast. When fermented, put in a jar and cork tight.
