Corn Stalks. The practice of placing corn stalks uncut before cattle, still prevails in many parts of the country. The blades are eaten off, the tender part of the tops perhaps, consumed, and the rest left on the ground to decay.

The analysis of the corn stalk shows its value as food for cattle to be very considerable, and the immense crop now raised of staple, warrants every experiment for the economical use of the stalks, to be carefully made.

Plan of a Corn Crib.

I built a corn crib a few years ago, which I think, for convenience, has but few equals. It has never failed to keep corn perfectly, and is likewise rat proof. It can easily be filled without the ordinary way of making doors in the roof, which are so difficult to make tight.

HARVESTING BUCKWHEAT.—Buckwheat is the most peculiar of the grain family in the manner of its ripening—a considerable portion being in the milk state when another will be fully matured.

A very convenient arrangement for holding bags while filling them may be easily made as follows: Take a piece of plank about twenty inches long and about a foot wide, level off the sides a little, and nail strips of thin board, that will spring, six or eight inches wide, to it for uprights.
