REGISTRY LAW I also give official notice to the electors of Clear field county that, by an act entitled "An act further supplemental to the set relativo to the elec

tions of this common wealth, approved April 17th A D 1559, it is provided as follows: Section 1 Best enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Common would be of Penu-sylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby weted by the authority of the same. That it shall be the duty of each of the accessors within this common wealth, on the first Monday of Jane in each year to take up the transcript he has received from the countycommissioners under the eighth section of the sect of fitteenth April, sighteen hundred and thirty four, and proceed to an immediate revision of the same by striking thoref, on the name of cve-ry person who is known by him to have died or re-moved since the last previous assessment from the district of which he is the assess r, or whose death or removal from the same shall be made known to him, and to add to the same the name of any qual-ified voter who shall be known to him to have moved into the district since the last previous as-sessment, and whose remotal into the same shall be or shall have been made known to bim, and also the names of all who shall make claim to him to be qualified voters therein. As soon as this revision is completed he shall visit every dwelling house is his district and make careful inquiry if any person whose name is on his list has died or removed from the district, and if so, to take the name therefrom, or whether any qualified voter resides therein whose name is not on the list, and if so, to add the same thereto; and in all cases where sname is added to the list a tax shall forth-with be assessed against the person; and the assersor shall in all cases ascertain, by inquiry. up on what ground the person so assessed claims to be a voter Upon the completion of this work it shall be the duty of each assessor as aforosaid to preceed to make out a list. in alphabetical order, of the white freemen above twenty-one years of age, claiming to be qualified voters in the ward, borough, township or district of which he is the assessor and opposite each of said names state whether said freeman is or is not a housekeeper ; and if he is, the number of his residence, in towns where the same are numbered with the street, alley or court in which situated; and if in a town where there are no numbers, the name of the street, alley of court on which said house fronts; also, the occupation of the person; and where he is not a housekeeper; the occupation, place of boarding and with whom, and if working for an other, the name of the employer, and write oppo-site each of said names the word "voter;" where any person claims to vote by reason of naturalisation, he shall exhibit his certificate thereof in the assessor, unless he has been for five consecutive years next proce ing a voter in said district, and in all cases where use person has been naturalla-ed, the nameshall be marked with the letter 'N', where the person has merely declared his intentions to become a citizen and designs to be natu-railized before the next election, the name shall be marked 'D I'; where the claim is to vote by reason of being between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-two, as provided by law, the word "age" shall be entered; and it the person has moved into the election district to reside since the last general election, the letter "H" shall be placed opposite the name it shall be the further duty of each assessor as aforesaid, upon the com-pletion of the duties herein imposed to make out a seperate list of all new assessments made by him, and the amounts assessed upon each, and furnish the same immediately to the county commissioners, who shall immediately add the names to the tax duplicate of the ward, borough, town-ship or district in which they have been stressed. SEC 2. On the list being completed and the as-semments made as aforesaid, the same shall forthwith be returned to the county commissioners, who shall cause duplicate copies of said lists with the observations and explanations required to be noted as aforeinid, to be made out as soon as pran-ticable and placed in the hands of the assessor, who shall prior to the first of August in each year. put one mopy thereof on the door of or on the bouse where the election of the respective district is required to be held, and retain the other in his possession, for the inspection, free of charge of any person resident in the said election district

neglect to require such proof of the right of suf-frage as is prescribed by this law, or the laws to which this is a supplement from any person of foring to vote whose name is not on the list of as-sessed voters, or whose right to vote is chall enged by any qualified voter present, and shall admit such person to vote without requiring such proof every person so offending, shall upon conviction be guilty of a high misdemeanor, and shall be sentenced, for every such offence, to pay a five not exceeding one handred dollars or to undergo an imprisonment not more than one year, or el ther or both, at the discretion of the court

Sec 7. Ten days preceding every election for electors of President and Vice President of the United States it shall be the duty of the Assessor to atten d at the place fixed by law tor holding the election in each election district, and then and there hear all applications of persons whose names have been omitted from the list of assess-ed voters, and who claim the right to rote or whose rights have originated since the same was made out, and shall add the names of such persuns therto as shall show that they are entito the right of suffrage in such district, on the personal application of the claimant only, and forthwith assess them with the proper tax. After completing the list, a copy thereof shall be placed on the door of or on the house where the election is to be held, at least eight days before the election ; and at the election the same course shall be pursued in all respects as is required by this not and the acts to which it is a supplement, at the general elections in October. The Assessor shall also make the same returns to the county commissioners of all assessments made by virtue of this section; and the county commissioners shall furnish copies thereof to the election off-cers in each district, in like manner, in all respects, as is required at the general elections in October

SEC. 8. The same rules and regulations shall apply at every special election, and at every sep-arate city, borough or ward election, in all re-
