THE GAME LAW. -In order that no one may plead ignorance as an excuse for its violation, we re-produce a synopsis of the game law passed by the Legislature :

It provides that "no person shall kill, or have unlawfully in his or her possession, or gert's saw mill, in Brady tp., to intersect expose to sale, any ruffed grouse or pheas road in Beli tp., across Curry's run. aut between the 20th day of December and December and the 1st day of October: or land in Brady tp. any wild turkey between the 1st day of Jansquirrel or rabbit between the 1st day of Kuntz's in Brady tp. January and the 1st day of August, under a penalty of five dollars for each and every tird or sonirrel so killed or unlewfully held in possession or exposed for sale. Deer cannot be killed between the 31st of December and the 1st of September, and the possestion of the fresh skin or carcas of one in near Thos. Rea's, in Jordan tp. that interval shall be sufficient to warrant a conviction.
