HORRIBLE ACCIDENT AND DEATH.—The Brookville Republican of February 2d, contains the following account of a most heart-rending accident, which occurred about one mile south of Bellevue, Jefferson county, on the last inst. Essays: "MR. LEANDER TETRICK went out early in the morning for the purpose of hauling timber, and was seen by a Mr. ENGLISH about ten o'clock while in the woods near his residence, in the act of loading a stack of timber. About five o'clock in the evening Mr. ENGLISH was returning from Kingwood, and when opposite the place where he had seen Mr. TETRICK in the morning, his attention was attracted by the wailings of a female in the woods; several other persons coming up at the time, they went to her assistance, when a most horrible sight met their gaze. In loading the log in the morning it had by some means slid or rolled upon Mr. TETRICK, and about half an hour before Mr. ENGLISH came up, his wife in searching for him found him a corpse with the log resting on his body. The anguish of the wife and mother upon such a discovery can more easily be imagined than expressed. He was the father of four children, who, almost frightened to death, were found crying in different parts of the woods, where they had strayed in the confusion. His body was taken up and removed to his home, where the friends and neighbors met to console the almost disconsolate wife.

OBITUARY.—On Monday morning, February 17th, 1870, of consumption, THOMAS LITTLE, aged 41 years, 7 months and 7 days. The deceased was a Scotchman by birth, emigrated to this country several years ago, and settled in Jordan township, in this county. Shortly after the outbreak of the late rebellion, he entered the army as Second Lieutenant of Company E, 14th Pennsylvania Volunteers, was afterwards promoted to a First Lieutenant, and served with marked distinction and bravery to the close of the war—having participated in all the battles in which the army of the Potomac was engaged, during that memorable and arduous struggle for the life of the nation. Mr. Little was a man of superior ability and talents—honest and industrious. Possessed of a strong and well balanced mind, of good and correct judgment, and an excellent education, he was highly esteemed by all who knew him, and was much admired and beloved for his uniform kindness and affability by his more intimate friends and acquaintances. His final departure was not unexpected to himself, his family, or friends, as all were cognizant of his rapid decline. But a few hours before his death, he remarked to the writer of this sketch, that he had no hopes, and he would not be surprised if he were here—having for some time past expressed himself as being ready and willing to depart hence to that bourne from whence none desire to return. Let him rest in peace.
