Another Railroad Project. A grand through-line railroad project is now before Congress, which is to traverse Pennsylvania from the southeast to the northwest. It is substantially the same general line chartered by the last Legislature of this State, and vetoed by the Governor on account of some unconstitutional provisions in the bill.

The House committee on Railways and Canals have the bill, above referred to, under consideration, and will, in all probability, recommend its passage. The bill authorizes the construction of a railroad and telegraph line from Washington, D. C., to week. Cleveland, or to the city of Erie, Pa., and names some twenty-eight corporators residing in Washington, Virginia, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Ohio.
