for the farmer.

Trespassing upon Gardens and Orchards.

We have several times printed the Legislative enactment bearing upon the marauders upon gardens and orchards, and we take occasion again calling attention to the subject, in order that all may be warned of the penalties incurred by pilfering of feowers, fruits, &c.

Let it be understood, therefore, that all persons offending are liable to arrest, by making complaint before an alderman or justice of the peace, and be held for trial. The testimony of the owner or occupant of the premises. Or, a civil action may be instituted against any person who may trespass upon and damage any garden, orchard or field of growing crops in any manner whatever, and judgment obtained for double the amount of damages proved to have been suffered, with costs of suit; and in default of payment the party may be committed to prison for not less than one or more than twenty days.

We trust that every offender will be promptly arrested and made suffer the penalty, without regard to person, age or sex; for it is only by this procedure that owners and occupants of premises will be enabled to protect their property-property as valuable as any other, and frequently prized even beyond its intrinsic value-against depredators of the most reckless description. The law now offers the necessary security, and hence it will in most cases be the fault of the owners if it is not put promptly into

We learn that wherever these offences have been criminally prosecuted it has had a most wholesome effect. A single arrest is all sufficient for one neighborhood. A jail is an ugly thing to contemplate-and a few days would probably scare out fruit and flowers stealing propensities for all time to come. Let the reckless take warning .-[Germantown Telegraph.

SALTING MILK COWS .- William Egger a Swiss dairyman of experience, states the method practiced in Switzerland by the best stock keepers in salting stock. He says cows should be salted early every morning, and if they are fed in the stable the salt should be given before foddering. Salting in this way improves their appetite; they drink with more regularity, are kept in better health, and give more milk than when salted in the usual way as practiced by dairymen in America. He thinks it very injurious to salt milk cows once or twice a week, as they will lick too much for the day. To bave stock to do well, they must be fed with regularity, every day alike, and never giventoo much of anything at one time.

He says, throwing a little salt before the cows in the morning, is much better than allowing them to have free access to it during the day or at all times, as they choose regularity, which has a very important influence in lessening the average yield of milk. Cows, he says, should never be salted after taking water, and then have no chance to drink for hours, as the irritation. on account of thirst, will of itself depreciate the quality of milk and lessen the quantity. These facts he says he learned from one of the best and most successful stock keepers in Switzerland, and has found, by repeated experiments in his own practice, to be the best course to be adopted by dairyman in salting cows, in order to get the most milk and, at the same time, keep them in good

HEALTH HINTS .- It is better to sleep in a room comfortably warm than it is to sleep in a very cold room, provided there is good ventilation, for the reason that less clothing is required to keep comfortable. The less clothing consistent with comfort, the better, whether awake or asleep. Warm air is just as good as cold air, and ventilation is more easily secured when there is a difference of temperature between the air in the room and that outside. The way of warming and ventilating sleeping-rooms, is to have an open grate and open windows. The months most fatal to life, are February and March, August and September; the first two for throat and lung difficulties, and the latter two for stomach and bowel complaints. May and June are the healthiest months

GRASS FOR BREEDING HOGS, -A correspondent of the Western Rural says: "A gool supp'y of grass for breeders is of untold tees for its early completion and successful opervalue. They should be put on pasture two or three weeks before breeding time, as it increases the milk greatly. Breeders, on a good supply of grass, with some corn, will not only retain their flesh, but grow continually, and be easily fattened in the fall or winter, while the pigs will be large and healthy, and their growth will not be checked during the winter. If breeders, with their pigs, are confined in small yards during the summer, and fed on grain alone, it will take two of the former to make a shadow in the fall while the latter will be small and poor, and go into winter quarters good subjects for disease."
