for the farmer.

For a man who is thoroughly in earnest farming offers a grand field for effort; but thinks that costly barns, imported stock and a nicely rolled lawn are the great objects of attainment may acomplish pretty results, but they will be small ones. But if a man, as we said, be thouroughly in earnest. if he have the sagacity to see all over the farm, to systematize his labor, to carry out his plans punctually and thouroughly; if he is not above economies, nor heedless to the teachings of science, nor unobservant of progress elsewhere, nor neglectful of such opportunities as were the Yale Agricultural Lectures-let him work, for he will have his reward. But even such an one will never come to his "four in hand," except they be colts of his own raising; or to private concerts in his own grounds, except what the Lirds make.

How to Fatten a Poor Horse, -Many good horses devour large quantities of grain or hay; and still continue thin and poor; the food extent is not properly assimulated. If the usual feed has been unground grain, nothing but a change will effect any desirable alteration in the appearance of the animal. In case oil meal cannot be obtained readily, mingle a bushel of flax seed with a bushel of barley, one of oats and another bushel of Indian corn and let it be ground into fine meal. This will be a fair proportion for all his feed. Or the meal or the barley, oats and corn in equal quantities, may first be procured, and one fourth part oil cake mingled with it, when the meal is sprinkled on cut feed. Feed two or three times daily, mingled with a peck of cut hay and straw. If the horse will eat that greedia horse that has run down in flash, the groom should be very particular to feed the uni mal no more than he will cat up clean, and lick his manger for more. - American Stock Journal.
