ANOTHER MORDER.-About I o'clock, P. M., on Saturday, August 6th, a man by the name of Michael Creyton, a miner, was found dead near Houtzdale, in this county, and about three miles west of Osceola. On Sunday morning, at 9 o'clock, 'Squire Bogers, of Osceola, summoned a jury and held on inquest, when it was found that the skull of the unfortunate man was fra tured, and several of his ribs broken. After a full investigation, the jury rendered the following verdict, to wit: "That the deceased came to his death by the hands of some person, or persons, unknown." Why the murder was committed is, so far, a mistery, and the perpetrators of the deed are still unknown. It is to be hoped, however, that they may be discovered and the merited punishment inflicted.

WATER. - We have frequently suggested the necessity of securing a sufficient supply of good water, for Clearfield, as the numer our sinks and respetacles of filth within our borough limits are affecting the wells, and rendering the water unlit for use. We now recur to the subject again, in the hope that some action will be had towards obtaining this indispensable dissideratum to the wellfare and convenience of our citizens. Moose creek, as we have heretofore demonstrated, is the source from which sufficient good and health preserving water can be obtained for all time to come—the stream being large enough to supply a population twenty or thirty times greater than we have at present. To accomplish this object, it will only be necessary to purchase the water privilege near its sources, and erect a permanent and ample reservior some two or three miles already established. (Nov. 24, 69-1y. up that stream, and convey it from thence in mains. The reservoir should be built far enough up the creek, so that its elevation would be sufficient to carry it above any point at which buildings may be erected within the borough. No doubt many will oppose this on account of its cost, but that must not stand in the way. The health of our people is paramount to all pecuniary considerations, and the day is rapidly approaching when it must be done. Then, why not do it now? What say the people'
