> EXECUTIVE CHAMBER. HARRISBURG, Pa., Aug. 27, 1870. To the County Commissioners and Sheriff of the County of

WHEREAS, The Fitteenth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States is as follows:

SEETION 1. The right of citizens of the U nited States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any State, on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

THE KIDNEYS.

The Kidneys are two in number, situated at the upper part of the loin, surrounded by fat, and consisting of three parts, viz : the Anterior, the Interior, and the Exterior.
