SELECTING CALVES FOR MILKERS.—A writer in one of our exchanges says: "The points that indicate the good cow are discernible in the calf, and why not? This may stagger some dairymen, but that is just what we wish to do. This wholesale slaughtering of calves in the spring is wrong. A calf will show a good milk mirror as well as a cow, a rich cream-colored udder as well as a cow, and a healthy look and a strong loin as well as a cow and these points make up a cow every time. Let the breed be what it may, this is our experience in the matter. A calf that shows ten or fifteen dollars should not be killed for its mere hide, for the lack of judgment in selecting."

GRAFTING THE PEAR ON THE APPLE.—J. J. Thomas says that grafting the pear on the apple stock occasionally succeeds with some varieties. We have seen the Seckel doubled in size by working on the apple, at the same time that its quality was lessened. But the union is imperfect, and the graft generally breaks off in a few years. Some varieties do tolerable well for a time, but we cannot recommend the practice, except to such as merely wish to amuse themselves with unsuccessful experiments.

Manure is never so valuable as when it is fresh. It then holds in association not only all the fixed soluble substances natural to the soil excrement, but much that is of great value found only in the liquid. It is in a condition to quickly undergo chemical change, and the gaseous ammoniacal products are double those resulting from that which had been withered in a heap out of doors for several months.

The Diehl wheat, which has of late been extensively introduced into Michigan, is said to be peculiarly liable to sprout and grow in harvesting, when the weather is damp and moist, as it has been this year in that state; and, in some cases, the shocks on whole fields of forty acres are almost green.

KIDNEY WORMS IN SWINE.—H. D. Court, the well known breeder of Chester White swine, of Battle Creek, Mich., writes, the Prairie Farmer that he has found a teaspoonful of pulverized copperas, mixed with an equal quantity of sulphur, fed in the night's meal, for three days, effective in this disease.

BLACK KNOT.—Cut it out at the first appearance, and burn. No doubt insects do find a lodgment in it, as they will in any soft part of the tree, but they are not the cause. It is a fungus which should not be allowed to mature and multiply.
