HANNER OF VOTING.

AN ACT regulating the mode of voting at all elections in the several counties of this Com Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. hat the qualified voters of the several election listricts of this Commonwealth, at all general township, borough and special elections are here by, hereafter as thorized and required to vote by tickets, printed or written, or partiv printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges f courts voted for, and to be labelled outside judiciary;" one ticket shall embrace the names of the State officers voted for, and be labelled. State;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including office of Senator, member and members of assembly, if voted for, and members of Congress, if voted for any declabelled "county;" one ticket shall em-brace the names of all township officers rates for, and be labelled "township; one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers roted for, and be labelled "bo ough;" and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot boxes.

Sec. 2. And be it further engeted. That

if by or under the authority of the constitution or laws of any State, or the laws of any territory, any act is or shall be required to be lone as a pre requisite or qualification for voting, and by such Constitution or laws persons or officers are or shall be charged with the performance of duties in furnishing to cities an opportunity to perform such pre-requisites, or to become qualified to vote it shall be the duty of every such person and officer to give all citizens of the United States the same and equal opportunity to perform such pro requisite, and to become qualified to vote without distinction of race, color, or previous condition of servitude; to and if any such person or officer shall refuse t to give full effect to this section, he shall for every such offence, feit and pay the sum of five hundred dollars to the person aggrieved thereby, to be re covered by an action on the case, with full costs and such allowance for counsel fees as the court shall deem just, and shall also, for every such offence, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, on conviction thereof, be fined not less than five hundred dollars, or be imprisoned not less than one month and not more than one year, or both.
