That the qualified voters of the several election listricts of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections are here hereafter authorized and required to vote by tickets, printed, or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges f courts voted for, and to be labelled outside, judicinry;" one ticket shall embrace the names f the State officers soted for, and be labelled. tate:" one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including office of anter, member and members of assembly, if voted for, and members of Congress, if voted for and be labelled "county;" one ticket shall em-brace the names of all township officers reted for, and be labelled "township; one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for, and be labelled borough; and each class
