PROCLARATION.

To the County Commissioners and Sheriff of the County of Clearfield :

WHEREAS, The Fiftcenth Amendment of he Constitution of the United States is as MOWS:

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any State, on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. That Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legis-

AND WHEREAS. The Congress of the United States on the 31st day of March, 1870, possed an act entitled. "An act to enforce the right of citizens of the United States of this Union, and for other purposes," the first and second sections of which are as follows:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled. That all citizes of the United States who are or shall be otherwise qualified to vote at any election by the people in any State, territory, listrict, county, city, parish, township, scho district, municipality or other territorial submeanor, and on conviction thereof, be fined or imprisoned, or both at the discretion of the court; but the fine shall not exceed one fundred dollars color, race, or previous condition of servicolor, race, or previous condition of servitude ; any constitution, law, custom, usage, or regulation of any State or Territory, or by or under its authority, to the contrary

And be it further enacted, That if by or under the authority of the constituion or laws of any State, or the laws of any erritory, any act is or shall be required to be done as a pre-requisite or qualification for voting, and by such Constitution or laws persons or officers are or shall be charged with the performance of duties in furnishing to cities an opportunity to perform such pre-requisites, or to become qualified to vote it shall be the duty of every such person and officer to give all citizens of the United States the same and equal opportunity to
