LARGE PURCHASE.—Mr. J. F. THE FAIR.—The Agricultural exhibition, this week, was a decided success, especially financially—the Society having realized a handsome profit over and above all expenses. The display of agricultural and mechanical products was not so large as we should like to have seen, yet a goodly number of articles were on exhibition, and these, generally, of a very superior character. AN ASSAULT.—We learn that four belligerent individuals, stimulated by an overdose of "beverage," on Saturday evening last, made an assault upon our townman, G. L. Reed Esq.—striking him about the head, knocking off his hat, and kicking it to pieces. The result was, two of them soon found themselves in the presence of "Squire Porter"—one of the others having made his escape, while another plead off as being innocent. It is far preferable to suffer a little inconvenience from a woolen shirt, during the warm part of the day than to suffer from chills in the evening.
