How People Take Cold.

Not by tumbling into the river and dragging home, wet as a drowned rat; not by being pitched into the mud, or spilled into the snow in sleighing time; not by walking for hours over shoe top in mud; not by soaking in the rain without an umbrella; not by hoeing potatoes until you are in a sweat; these are not the things which give people colds and yet they are all the time telling us how they "caught their death cold by exposure."

The time for taking cold is after your exercise. It is not the act of exercise which gives the cold, but the getting cool too quick after exercising.

For example, you walk very fast to get to the railroad station, or for any other purpose, and when you get to the desired spot you raise your hat, and find yourself in a perspiration; you take a seat, feeling quite comfortable as to temperature, and before you are aware of it, you experience a sensation of chilliness, and the thing is done. You look around to see where the cold comes from, and find an open window near you, or a door, or you have taken a seat in the draft.

After any kind of exercise do not stand a moment at a street corner for anybody nor anything, nor at an open door or window. When you have been exercising in any way whatever, winter or summer, go home at once, or to some sheltered place, and however warm the room may be, do not at once pull off your hat and coat, but wait awhile, say five mintes or more, and lay aside one thing at a time; thus acting, a cold is impossible. Notice a moment: when you return from a brisk walk and enter a warm room, raise your hat, and your forehead will be moist; let the hat remain a few moments and feel the forchead again, and it will be dry, showing that the room is actually cooler than your body, and that, with out-door clocking on. you have really cooled off full scott enough.

Many of the severest colds I have known men to take, were the result of sitting down to a warm meal in a cold room, after a long walk; or, being engaged in writing, have left the fire go out, and their first admoni tion of it was that ereeping chilliness which is the ordinary forerunner of a severe cold. Persons have often lost their lives by writing or reading in a room where there was no fire, although the weather outside was rather comfortable. Sleeping in rooms long unused has destroyed the life of many a visitor and friend. Our splendid parlors and our nice "spare rooms" help to enrich many a doc tor .- Hall's Journal of Health.

CORN FODDER. - After the corn is fit to husk, the quicker the job is done and the fodder stacked, the better. We would quite as lief feed cornstalks out of a stack of Jersey barrack, as those stored in a barn, pro vided the stack is well made. No more than a foot of the butts should be exposed to the weather, and the top "pointed off" with good rye straw. It will take several bundles to top a big stack as it should be.
