for the farmer.

FEED HAY CAREFULLY. -There are hundreds of tons of hay lost every winter among farmers by careless feeding. We have been Tin and Sheet Iron Ware, astonished sometimes when witnessing the amount around barnyards and stacks. The waste is entirely unnecessary, and if it was made the rule of every farmer not to feed any kind of stock upon the ground, thousands of dollars might be saved annually. There are times, to be sure where the earth is frozen dry and clean, but if racks are not provided full half of the time the hay will be dealt out either in wet, snow or mud, and a good portion lost. Portable racks should be used around stacks and their location changed every few days. The racks should be so constructed that the stock can get at their feed handily, and at the same time so that the hay cannot be pulled out and trampled under foot.

How Much BEEF FROM A BUSHEL OF CORN.-P. C. Compton, Amer, Iowa, asks the Farmers' Club how much beef a bushel of corn meal will make, fed to two and three year old steers, well sheltered. Thinks the subject important. Deacon Reade had not the figures, but suggested that the amount would depend upon the condition, age, and breed of the animal. He did not believe that any man ever got rich making beef from grain alone; that the money made by feeding the cattle for market is made off the grass they eat. Without grass, corn fed to cattle will not bring the feeder fifty cents a

PUDDING WITHOUT MILK OR EGGS .-Soak dry bread in as little water as possible. and squeeze out all the water. Add sufficient sugar to sweeten, and for a small pudding, half a teacupful of chopped suct or butter, and dried fruit which has been soak ed over night, or canned or fresh fruit. Mix well together, adding a little allspice. The pudding is put into a greased tin pail, a cloth placed over, and the cover put on. The pail is set in a kettle containing sufficient water to come half way up the pail; boil for two hours or more for a large pudding. To be eaten with sauce.

SALT AND ASHES FOR HORSES. - Those keeping borses should, twice a week, throw in a handful of salt and ashes. Mix them by putting three parts of salt to one of ashes. Horses relish this, and will keep their hair short and fine. It will prevent bots, colic, &c. A little ground sulphur mixed with salt and ashes, and given once in two or three weeks is beneficial.

CANNED Eggs. -All who know how to can peaches and other fruits, and the canning of eggs, to keep them fresh is but little different. Place the eggs in the jar in boiling water, where let it remain until the inner atmosphere of the jar is about blood heat, when seal, and remove into cold wat-
