

GRAT FIRE IN NEW YORK.—The cotton sugar refinery of Woolsey & Co., South street near Clinton, New York, destroyed by fire on Saturday; the breaking out about one o'clock, and the fire continuing to burn until a late hour Saturday evening. The establishment was the oldest in the country, and the most extensive, having been established in 1833. The stock alone, which was almost entirely destroyed, is estimated at \$535,000, and the entire loss will not fall below \$800,000, but a small portion of which is covered by insurance. The establishment gave employment to 460 men, all of whom are thrown out of employment.—*Daily News.*
