

From the New Orleans papers, July 25.  
**Later from the Army.**

The steamship Fashion, Capt. Fullerton, arrived at New Orleans, on the 24th of July, and, from the papers of that city, we learn verbally that there is a general movement of the troops up the Rio Grande. General Taylor was still at Matamoros, but he was sending forward the recruits as fast as his means of transportation would permit him to do so.

Col. Gates, Col. Whistler, Maj. Thomas and Lieut. Auger, came passengers. The Monmouth and Augusta were at the Brazos. The Sea left on Monday; the brig Empress and bark Ivy on Tuesday. The Wm. H. Chapin arrived on Monday with the balance of the Georgia regiment.

The Rio Grande had overflowed its banks, and the small steamboats found it difficult to stem the current in ascending to Matamoros.

Some 4,000 of the Georgia, Alabama, Kentucky, Tennessee and Ohio volunteers, were on Brazos Island. The heavy rains that had fallen rendered it impossible to find comfortable quarters, and the troops were moving forward. The Alabama regiment were to have left on Monday—the sick of the steamer Cincinnati.

One company of the regulars and one of the Texian volunteers, were at Point Isabel. Hays' regiment was stationed fifteen miles above.

It is reported that General Taylor has made ample provision for the transportation and subsistence of his troops, and that he will soon advance upon Monterey.

Gen. Smith's brigade is encamped six teen miles above Reynosa.

No reliable information has been received with regard to the Mexican forces.

The Court Martial for the trial of Col. Whistler and others was held, and the proceedings forwarded to Washington city.

**CAMARGO TAKEN.**

Advices have arrived of the taking of the town of Camargo. Six companies of the 7th Regiment entered that place a day or two before the Fashion sailed, without firing a gun. These companies were under the command of Capt. Whiting and others. When the United States troops arrived at Camargo, Col. Carrizabal was on the opposite side of the St. Juan river. He witnessed the entrance of the troops into the town, but offered no resistance.

Gen Taylor had received reports from reconnaissance parties, who reported only three hundred troops at Monterey. The general impression in the army was that there would be no resistance offered to the American forces this side of that city. No preparations for an attack of the town were made. The absence of every thing that indicated resistance on the part of the enemy had led to the belief in the army that the war was at an end. The impression was that negotiations for peace were on foot. There was no other way of accounting for the apparent supineness of the Mexicans.

Reports had reached the camp that Paroles was afraid to leave the city of Mexico—his presence there being necessary to keep down a threatened revolution. Occasional broils between the Mexicans and Texian volunteers occurred. The regular soldiers exerted every means for the protection of the citizens, who were promised security and support in case they conduct themselves in a peaceable and inoffensive manner.

There was a rumor in camp that Mr. Lunsden, of the Precursors, and his party had been intercepted and cut off by the Indians. The report was not generally credited. The steamship Galveston, cleared at N. Orleans on the 25th July, for Matagorda Bay, having on board three companies of Illinois volunteers. She was to have sailed last evening, but is detained till Monday morning for the purpose of taking Gen. Wool and suite, who are destined to San Antonio de Bexar.

**The California Expedition.**—We paid a visit to Governor's Island, for the purpose of seeing if the good reports given of the body of volunteers there, soon to embark for California, were true; and, indeed, we were agreeably surprised in finding everything so different from what we expected in a number of men but lately collected together. They are encamped on the south eastern side of the island, and their new white tents, pitched with military supervision, present a fine appearance. There are now on the ground eight companies, comprising about 600 men; which will be increased to the full regimental number of 770 by the arrival of two companies enrolled in the interior of the State. In watching the men as they stood in line, we could not but notice the excellent material composing them. Some companies, indeed, are like picked men; strong, able-bodied mechanics generally, in the prime of life, and already somewhat schooled in the discipline of the service.

Col. Bankhead, the respected and efficient commander of the island, is doing his utmost to facilitate the improvement of the volunteers, and from his remarks, we judge that he is much pleased with their appearance. One company under the command of Capt. Steele, is composed entirely of temperance men. The regiment will undergo a strict drill for about three weeks, and then embark in three chartered vessels for California. The idea of sending a convoy is abandoned. If this body of men under such officers, and of such stamina themselves, do not create a new state of things in the region to which they go, we are much mistaken in our anticipations.—*N. Y. Herald.*

**A New Lead Mine.**—A new lead mine has been discovered near Phoenixville, in Chester county, Pa. upon the farm of Mr. Peter Kinsey. It was discovered by a laboring man while digging in one of the fields. The ore has been tried, and is said to yield from 10 pounds of ore, 6 pounds of pure lead.
