The Revenue.

"AVe have procured from the Treastry an official letter from the Secretary of the Pressury, in reply to a communication from the Hon. Mr. Adams, of Mississij pi, which letter, with the table annexed, are given below. It oppears that the actual augmentation of receipts for duties for the first seven monthe and ten days under the tariff of 1846, as compared with the same time under the tariff of 1842, exceeds one million of dollars; and that, adding the augmentation is progressing, and that Mr. Walker's estimate will be more than real ized by the result.

Siki The gross receipts from customs from the 1st of December, 1846, to the 10th July, 1847, under the tarift of 1846. compared with the same period of the previous year under the tariff of 1842, exhibitean increase of the tariff of 1846 of one million and four thousand dollars.
