**DREADFUL SHIPWRECK.**  
Loss of the Swedish Bark Iduna. - One Hundred and Seventy Two Persons Drowned.  
A telegraphic despatch from Boston for the New York Herald makes the following melancholy announcement: "The ship Changoon, Patten, from Liverpool, 13th ult., bound to this port, reports that on Monday morning, 9th inst. at 1 o'clock the weather foggy, he came in contact with the Swedish bark Iduna, from Hamburg for New York, with 200 persons on board, and that the bark sunk in 30 minutes after the collision. Captain Patten immediately sent his boats to the rescue, and with one boat from the bark, picked up 34 persons - 172 perished. Among them was Capt. A. A. Moberg, master of the Iduna, and his wife, and several passengers. Captain Patten, Frederick Ruhn, Chas. Seiz and wife, Daniel Gunther, Frederick Kaborg, Johanna Wemmel, H. F. Rullose. The passengers in the Iduna were composed of industrious Swedes, who were coming to this country with considerable sums of money in their possession, for the purpose of purchasing farms and settling in the West. The collision was so sudden and unexpected, and the vessel sank so soon afterward, that none of the passengers had time to clothe themselves. Most of them, however, secured their money, which was mostly in gold, about their persons, which accounts for the serious loss of life. Those who were saved had been in the water nearly half an hour when they were picked up, during which time those who had gold about their persons had sunk. It is supposed that Capt. Moberg, master of the barque, had \$1400 in gold about his person. So far as we can ascertain a good watch was kept on board the Shanunga, but at the time of the collision the fog was so dense that the bow of the ship could not be seen from the quarter-deck. If both vessels had had lanterns burning brilliantly at their bows, this dreadful accident might not have occurred. Captain Patten came ashore this morning from the Shanunga, which was anchored in the stream. Capt. P. is wholly incapacitated, by the depth of his feelings, from entering into any details at present, relative to this melancholy event. He says that no statement could exaggerate the horrors of that awful moment. All the survivors that were saved were picked up from the surface of the water. One cause why so few were thus saved was, that almost all of them had, when the gey went round that she was sinking, seized their belts of gold and silver, and tied them around their waists; thus those who had attempted to save their gold lost both life and gold, being unable to sustain themselves until their boats could reach them. It is estimated that something like \$50,000, or even \$100,000 in specie, belonging to the immigrants, went down in the vessel, or on the bodies of the lost. One individual lost \$14,000."
