

SPEECH OF GENERAL SICKLES.

The following is a full report of the speech of General Sickles, at Saratoga, last Friday evening, made in response to a serenade.

Ladies and Gentlemen: It is embarrassing to be the recipient of honors which I should share. I am quite aware that I am mainly indebted for this graceful compliment to your just admiration for the brilliant conduct of the Third Army corps at Chancellorsville and Gettysburg.

It is not too much to say that we have already accomplished more than was deemed possible by warlike nations and high military authority in Europe; and when the declining energies of the rebellion relinquish the sword now held with a feeble grasp, this country will take its place in the foremost rank of nations.

Military Notices.

CERTIFICATES OF PHYSICIANS. SECTION 86 OF THE REGULATIONS for the government of the Bureau of the Provost Marshal General reads as follows: No certificate of a physician or surgeon is to be received in support of any claim of a drafted man for exemption on medical grounds, unless the facts and statements therein set forth are attested on oath by a civil magistrate competent to administer oaths.

\$800 EXEMPTION. Sec. 2 of Circular 34 issued by the Provost Marshal General reads as follows: The Collector of Internal Revenue in each Congressional District has been authorized by the Secretary of War, and directed by the Secretary of the Treasury, to receive from drafted persons, who wish to pay for the purpose of exemption, the money above specified (\$800). On receipt of this sum, the Collector of Internal Revenue shall give the drafted person paying the duplicate receipt. One copy of this receipt shall be delivered to the Bureau of Enrollment on or before the date the drafted person is required to report for duty; and when so delivered to the Board, the drafted person shall be furnished with a receipt for the same.

ALIENS. Circular 35 issued by the Provost Marshal General prescribes that any person claiming exemption on the grounds of alienage, shall file with the Board an affidavit stating that he is an alien, and setting forth the Government to which he claims to be a subject.

Substitutes. Section 7 of Circular 33 issued by the Provost Marshal General states that "all persons who may be drafted, and who desire to present a substitute, shall give notice in writing to the Board of Enrollment that on such a day they will present a substitute, giving name, residence, age, and stating whether he is an alien or citizen.

THE QUOTA. The quota assigned to this Congressional District is Two Thousand, Two Hundred and Sixty-Six. The draft will be for this number, with fifty per centum added.

THE DRAFT. The Draft for the Counties of Adams, Bedford, Franklin, Fulton and Somerset, comprising the Sixteenth Congressional District, will commence at the Masonic Hall, Chambersburg, at 10 o'clock on the morning of Monday, August 14th inst., and continue from day to day until the work is completed.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 10. Be it enacted that any person who shall be drafted in the possession of the different U. S. Quarter Masters of this Department, are hereby notified that upon their making affidavit before a Justice of the Peace, and stating the reliability of the said parties making the oath, having been substantiated by the testimony of two respectable witnesses in writing, they present such papers to the Quarter Master holding the horse or horses in question they will be allowed to receive the same as vouchers for said property.
