# LOCAL ITEMS.

DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION .- The Democratic Convention met in the Court House on the lst inst., and organized with Samuel Fisher as President ; Geo. Forthman and Josiah Fickes as Vice Presidents and Dr. Wm. A. Hunter and J. M. Irwin as Secretaries. On motion of C. M. Dnncan, Eeq., of this place, a committee was appointed to arrange the order of business, as it seemed to be understood that the Convention didn't know how the machine was to be run; and is Mr. Duncan had charge of the "slate," which appropriated the chief honors' and emoluments to the borough of Chambersburg, Mr. Duncan put the machine in order under cover of a committee, of which he, of course, was chairman. That part of the programme having been arranged, Mr. Duncan moved the appointment of a committee on resolutions, und'a committee was appointed with Mr. Duncan as chairman. One of the points laid down; in the strategy of the borough: managers was the overthrow of Mr, Jacoby," and Mr. Duncan with his committee, having reversed the usual order, of nominations so as to bring Assembly first, and make the rural delegates vote on Assembly under an enfilading fire from the masked batteries of Chambersburg, the machine was ready to start. JOINT RESOLUTION PRO

A JOINT RESOLUTION PRO-POSING CERTAIN AND ENTS TO THE CUASTITUTION. Be it resolved by the Senate annumber of Representa-tices of the Commonwealth of Poinsylvanis in General Ascembly med. That the following americ ments be prop-sed to the Comstitution of the Commonwealth, in accord-ance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof: There shall be an additional section to the third articles of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

of the Ganstitution, to be designated as against the follows: Sectors 4. Whenever any of the qualified electrics of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual affiltary ser-vice, under a requisition from the President of the Uni-ted States, or by the authority of this Gommonwealth, such electors inay exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their namal place of election. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh and nine, as follows:

Scotton 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature

SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills. Sections 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature tranting any powers, or privileges, in any cuse, where the anthority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been, or may hereafter be, conferred upob the courts of this Commitmwealth.
