about 300 miles northwest of Austin which they attacked and succeeded in killing about 150 Indsans, captured 32 prisoners and about 500 horses and mules. Among the captives are two Mexican boys. Colonel Moore with his command, arsived at Austin on the 7th instant,, and was received by the inhabitants with the highest demonstrations of joy and commendation.

Daring Attempt to Rob the U. S. Mail. This morning, about 5 o'clock, and about four miles west of the Schuvlkill Permonant Bridge, the driver of a two horse coach, carrying the Lancaster way mail, was sotpeed by two men armed. After blowing out the light in his coach, one of them threatened his life by presenting a pistol at him, while the other proceeded to take out the mail bag. After securing it they left him and went off toward this city. The driver, who is a lad, immediately returned to the city. During this morning the mail bag was found a mile east of the spot where the coach was stopped, unopened. Its being unrifled of its contents, may be attributed to the robbers having been alarmed, on the discovery by them that it was a small and unimportant mail, and not worth the trouble of opening. It certanly was a daring attempt, so near the city, and on Saturday morning too, when the road is so much travelled by personcoming to market,-Philad. Gazette.
