A messege was received from the House of Representatives announcing that the House had chosen a joint committee of three upon the Library, and asked a committee on the part of the Senate. Mr. Tustin therefor having a majority of votes was declared to be duly elected.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. BRIGGS announced the death of Col. Hex-TER, late assistant door keeper of the House. He died yesterday afternoon. Mr. Brigg's then off-red a resolution directing the Clerk to defray the funeral expenses out of the contingent fund.

This having been agreed to, Mr. Briggs then offered a resolution to the effect that the office of assistant door keeper is not necessary.

The resolution was agreed to as follows :- year 123, nays 3. So hereafter there will be no assistant door keeper.

After some debate of a conversational character. a resolution was adopted, which provides that all petitions and bills referred to Committees at the last session and not acted on, shall be again referred.

Mr. UNDERWOOD asked leave to offer a resolution providing for the "reporting" of the House, but objection being made it was not received.

The House then proceeded to the election of a Chaplain. The Rev. J. N. Marritt receiving a majority of votes, was declared duly elected.
