## From the Richmond Wh'g.

Effects of a Tariff on the North and South. We copy from the Savannah Republican an interesting letter from a Boston gentleman, touching the effects of a Tariff-a subject which is again beginning to attract great public consideration. The views of the writer may pass with the reader for what they are worth, and with some in the south, who have been in the habit of considering n Tariff the deadlest for to Southern interests, they may be considered next to treasonable. But this Females, Beware of Consumption, shall not deter us from endeavoring to put in possection of our residers the ablest views on every side of every great question of public concern.

"We saw it stated, bro-dly and roundly, that a Tariff was unconstitutional-we looked to the Constitution itself, and found there the assettion flatly contradicted-for the power, full and us qualified, is expressly given to Congress to impose duties. In fact, the constitutional right of Congress, in this particular, was never questioned until the late Judge Barbour, in some of his abstract vagaries, stumbled upon it. It was capital for the so called Virginia School-and it has been used in that way to the present day.

The constitutional difficulty removed, we have looked to the effects of a Tariffupon the North and the South-so far as we could ascertain and understand them. We have seen that all the predictions of the wisest heads, previous to the Tariff of '16 and '28, have been falsified by the results. Mr. Rand Joh, one of the most sugicious men that ever lived, affirmed, that the increased tariff would destroy the revenue, and render a resort to direct taxation necessary to the support of the Government. Mr. Clay and Mr. Webster both admitted the probability of such a result. And yet in a few years, the great difficulty was to dispose of the immense surplus revenue! Those articles, which it was supposed, the increased duty would exclude altogether, or render very dear, were bought cheap er than ever. And during the greater period of the high Tariff, the whole country, the South as well as the North, enjoyed a degree of national prosperity, unprecedented in the annals of any people, The Tariff may not have been, and we do not suppose it was, the sole cause of this pulmy state of national affairs. But that it did not exert a baneful influence is manifest; and that on the contrary, it was a potent auxiliary in the creation of national wealth, is greatly corroborated by the blight which has come over us since its decline, almost to the point of admitting articles free of duty.

As to the operation of a Tariff upon the South, and Virgina particularly, we endess that we have not been able to discover its injurious effects.
