At several, the demand for specie was rather active for Western and the Bank of North America. Before sided, and confidence was evidently gaining ground ville Democrat, with the people. ## Resumption Facts.

We have ascertained by application to-day, the following facts, concerning the payments and deposites of specie yesterday :

The Philadelphia Bank paid out in specie 10,-000 dollars, and received on deposite 7,000, and in New York funds 4,809 dollars, making a nett gain of 1.800 dollars.

The Commercial Bank paid out in coin 5,379 and in New York funds 2,500 dollars, making a mett gain of 1,127 dellars.

In the aggregate, all the Banks paid out in specie and their own specie notes 137,500 dollars, and received on deposite specie, specie funds, such as New York drafts, &c. to the amount of 139,-000 dollars, showing a deficit of 28,000 dollars.

The Bank of North America paid out about 6,-000 dollars more than they received yesterday.

The Northern Liberties Bank and other banks were busy to-day, and it is conjectured that there as but a triffing difference between amounts received and amounts paid yesterday .- Phil. Gaz.

In short, a sound currency is now established beyond the risk of being again depreciated by the mystifications of financiers. This is a result in which the country has greater reason to rejoice than in any event since the restoration of peace, and the 17th of March, 1842, will deserve to be long remembered by our people as the auspicious day of their deliverance from the misery and disgrace of bank suspensions."
