As many of our readers, perhaps have not exactly got the hang of the subject matter in dispute between the belligerent parties in Ehode Island, we copy the following explanation from the Hartford Courant of Monday, which places the matter in a clear and intelligible light :- Phil. Gazette.

RHODE ISLAND .- Our readers are probably aware that within a year, there have been two conventions held in Rhode Island, each for the purpose of framing a new constitution for the State. One convention was held according to law, and the constitution submitted by them to the people has been rejected by a majority of about 600 votes. The other consention was held without warrant of law, and was composed of delegates chosen at party meetings. The constitution submitted by the illegal convention (called the free suffrage convention) to their constituents, has been approved by them, and declared to be the paramount law of the land. The party are preparing to hold elections under it, determined, as they say to enforce it at the point of the bayonet, if necessary. The conse-

quence is, that there is great excitement throughout the State. It has risen to an alarming height -and each party, the old government and the suffrage, are preparing to settle the puestion by force. The G vernor has issued his proclamation, calling on the military commanders to call out the militia ann hold them in readiness to act at a moment's warning. On the other hand, the suffrage party are organizing and arming themselves for the con-
