FOR THE AMERICAN. EDUCATION.

Mn. Entron-There is nothing so interesting and important to man, then the development of our moral and intellectual faculties. This subject has occupied the attention of the wisest and best of our race, and various methods have been published to the world which were designed to facilitate such a desirable object. Man makes his appearance upon the stage of action, ignorant of all moral and religious truths; he is even ignorant of that Being who hath given him life and breath, and sustains his animal existence by continued acts of kindness and mercy. Respecting his physical endowments, he is equally destitute and powerless: for whilst instinct teaches the waterfowl to seek its natural ehement, and the beast of the field to procure its appropriate nourishment, man requires in the first period of his existence the helping hand of affectionate parents and kind friends. Whatever knowtedge he, therefore, acquires in subsequent years, thust be the result of severe and continued application. The faculties of the human mind are consequently altogether dormant; they are like the potter's clay, which you can shape and mould into different forms, and impress upon it any thing you may think proper. You can then either leave man on a level with the unsutored Hottentot, or make him a fit companion of our wisest philosophers and statesmen. From this you will perceive, that in our primitive state, we have only the disposition to acquire useful knowledge, and whatever we receive in the course of our earthly career, we must obtain from those who have already extensively progressed in the development of the human mind. It is scarcely necessary for me to remind you of

the necessity and importance to make use of all the facilities which are within our reach, thoroughly to train the rising generation to usefulness and active life. We are decidedly an improving nation; and that continual discoveries and improvements should be made in the arts and sciences, and we remain stationary in our methods of instruction, would be beneath the dignity of man, and derogatory to his moral character. When I recall to my mind my own school days, and remember the few imperfect books which were then given into the hands of youth, I do not wonder that, at the present time, a bright and intelligent boy of ten years has made more progress in the acquirements of useful knowledge, than one of fifteen in former days. The reason is very obvious; not because the boys in my younger days had less talent or intelligence, or less industry or application, but because the methods of instruction are now better and school books improwed; and if a boy at the present time has merely ordinary intellect, he cannot help but in a short period to prepare himself for usefulness and the doties of active life. However, permit me to say that, in one particular, no improvement has been made. It is this: in former days the Holy Bible was used in common schools as a reading book, and thus the first principles of christianity were imperceptibly impressed upon the tender mind of the scholar. It is true, it is the opinion of some that the Bible should not be thus used, and that a rational being should first receive his intellectual culture, and then in riper years the truths of divine revelation should be presented for his acceptance. We must, however, remember that man is a religious being, and that it is atterly impossible that he can live to certain period, without receiving some moral and religious impressions! The Bible was my first reading book, and I can assure you that, at the age of eight years, I received moral lessons which influenced my conduct favorably in later days, and also obtained impressions of the divine character and my moral responsibilities which will never be eradica-

That I am not alone in my opinions, has been ully demonstrated by a pamphlet, lately bublished by Mr. Bache, Posident of the Girard College in Philadelphia. The Trustees of that institution sent Mr. Bache to Europe, with instruction to visit the different seminaries of learning in England, France and Germany, and to report on the different methods of instruction pursued in those institutions. He did so to the satisfaction of those who sent him, and, in his enumeration of the different text books, the Bible, with a few exceptions, stands at the head of every list. Now, notwithstanding the superior learning of the European teachers, still they think it indispensably necessary to retain the good old bank, and, at least two or three hours a week, teach their pupils the divine principles it inculestes.
