#### Our Imports and the Duties.

In the course of a speech in Congress a few days since, the Hon. Mr. Triplett stated that from the year 1833 to 1840 inclusive, seven years, the whole amount of imports into the United States, with the duties added on them, was 1,113,000,000 dollars, of which the United States kept for duty on them 121 per cent., or about 112,981,000 dollars, and the foreign producer retained over 874 per cent., or 990,000,000.

Our imports from Europe slone, for the same period of seven years, amounted to 556,000,000 dollars, the amount of duties received on which by the United States was about 16 per cent., or 88,-578,000 dollars.

Our exports to the balance of the world besides Europe were \$74,000,000 for the same period, making a total amount of \$33,000,000 dollars of exports without duty levied by foreign nations added, and showing a balance of trade against us, under the present existing state of things, of an amount equal to 157,000,000 dollars, 990,000,000 as before stated, being the amount retained by foreign producers from our imports.

Now, had our commerce with foreign nations been regulated on equal and reciprocal termsterms on which any nation, free and independent, indeed, ought to trade with other nations-i. e. had they levied no higher duty on our exports than we did on imports into this country, instead of paying to Europe \$569,000,000 in duties levied by her on our exports to that portion of the world, if her rates of duty had been in proportion to ours, she would have levied on our exports \$122,000,000; and thus it appeared that the excess in the duties paid by us for this period of seven years, was \$445,000,000 .- Bicknell's Reporter.

PROMPT RETRIBUTION AND A BOLD ACT .-Some villian-some scoundrel of the deepest cast, was in the act of placing an obstruction on the rails of the L. Island Rail Road, east of Farmingdale, on Wednesday last, just at evening. A young man from New York who was in quest of game, in a thick wood immediately seeing him to be a very stout, gallows looking fellow, he declined interfering except from the mouth of his gun. After the villian had placed a heavy iron rail in such a way as he thought would be effectual in throwing the train from the track and was about darting in the wood opposite, the young man fired upon him with one barrel of his gun, leaving the other to defend himself if necessary, the charge of shot took effect in his back and neck, and the guilty villian fled. This was a most meritorious act by a young man 17 years of age -Brooklyn News.

VEGETABLE IVORY .-- It is said that the French discovery ships have introduced, from the South Seas, a new vegetable, resembling the cocoa nut, but much smaller. When the outer shell is removed, the interior presents the appearance, and possesses all the proprieties, of the finest ivory. In the manufacture of articles to which its size is adapted, it is supposed that this vegetable product will entirely supersede the more costly tooth of the elephant.




