It was at this fountain, situated in a romantic valley, where one of the most spacious, limpid and beautiful springs, that ever gushed from a lime stone rock, is to be found, that the gallant Colonel Howard of the Maryland line crossed the steel of his regiment with that of the British Grenadiers, to determine perhaps who should drink first.

To this letter Gen. Hamilton received the following answer:—

"HONOR GUARDS, April 7, 1842.

Sir: I have the Duke of Wellington's commands to acknowledge the receipt of two letters from you, the one of the 22d ult. with an enclosure from Mr. Ravenel, and the other marked private.

The Duke has read with great interest the narrative which you have with so much kindness taken the trouble to lay before him, explanatory of the event and of the inscription upon the head board, which had been placed over the grave of the late Major Majorbanks of the 19th Regiment, and in thus thanking you for that communication his Grace desires me to assure you that he fully appreciates the good feeling of Mr. Ravenel, and the generous motives and conduct of that gentleman in the construction of a more lasting memorial in honor of the name and character of a British officer, who died in a distant country, when employed in the execution of his military duty.

Having unsuccessfully endeavored to find any of the relatives of the late Major Majorbank, whose name appears to be differently spelt from that of the family in this country, to which it the more nearly applies, it only remains for me to assure you that the head board which accompanied your letter shall be duly deposited in a place the most likely to fulfil the object of your considerate and benevolent intention.

SHOOTING ACCIDENT.—On Thursday last Mr. William McCarty, son of Samuel McCarty, of Turbot township, met with an untimely death; it appears, as far as we can understand, that he took his gun and went out in the morning for the purpose of shooting crows, promising to be back by noon, but not coming his father went in search of him, and found his boy lying in the woods dead, having accidentally shot himself, while in the act of loading his gun. He was about 20 years of age.

Milloniam.

Steamboat Missouri.

It is stated in a New York paper that this unfortunate vessel, which has cost the Government about \$500,000, has been laid up in ordinary for many months, as useless or too expensive for the public service, in consequence of defects and errors in calculations in the construction of her engines and machinery. The Secretary of the Navy, unwilling that a ship so capacious and valuable should remain useless, and agreeing with his engineers-in-chief that certain alterations and improvements should be made, by which to increase the speed of the vessel and diminish the cost of fuel, ordered such improvements, which will be completed in all this month. Among the proposed improvements was that of shortening the smoke pipe, by which the mainmast of the vessel may be used, which has heretofore been useless. Also, the addition of an engine and blower, and the ventilation of the engine-room, which sometimes has been suffocatingly hot, the mercury ranging at 170 to 182, from which several engineers have been taken from their duty in spasms and in a dying state, one of whom did actually lose his life by the excessive heat. Some of the proposed alterations have been made; but the trial of the vessel since has proved them ineffectual of any material benefit. While we regret the public loss in the failure of the Missouri, we have not, nevertheless, forgotten the bright paragraphs which appeared in some of the New York papers about the time she was put afloat at this city and the Mississippi at this. The comparisons of the cost of the two, the time which they made on their first trip, &c., were all untrue in fact and alike unjust to the latter vessel and to the citizens of our city engaged in her construction. Truth, though sometimes slow, is ever sure.—Phil. Ledger.

THE PLANET MARS.—A correspondent of the Boston Transcript says that on this evening, the 6th instant, the planet Mars will come into opposition to the Sun, and consequently will be near the point of its least distance from the Earth. This planet now rises in the southeast, a little after sunset, and shines with a brilliancy little anticipated by those who have only seen it when most remote from us; in which position it was in June last, when about 240 millions of miles or more than five times its present distance, which is only 44 millions. The retrograde motion of the planet, or its apparent reversed motion from east to west, is now also very perceptible, even to the naked eye.

Office of the BALTIMORE AMERICAN, June 12. GRAIN.—A cargo of 1800 bushels good quality Pennsylvania red wheat was sold on Saturday at \$1.16. There has been none in market since. We quote Md. reds at 95 a 112 cts for ordinary to prime lots. Sales of Md. white Corn to-day at 55 cts. A sale of Penna. yellow to-day at 58 cents for common and 54 cts. for prime. We hear of no sales of Oats—they are worth 28 a 29 cts for Maryland.

WHISKEY.—The demand is less and prices have declined a shade. Sales to-day of hhd. at 25 cts. and of bbl. at 26 cts.
