Reading Rail Road .-- The Loan Obtained.

Though the efforts of the President, Mr. Cryder, to negociate a loan in England for the Philadelphia & Reading Rail Road Company were unsuccessful, yet the event has proved most fortunate for all concerned; as, since his return, the sum of about One Million of Deflars has been obtained in our own country, chiefly at New York and Boston, at the rate of 9 per cent. This will be gratifying news to all interested in this important work-the amount being amply sufficient to complete the second track with 60 Us. tails, and stock the road with a full completaent of Engines and Cors. The Iron has altendy been engaged, and the first cargo will arrive in February next. Operations will be commenced as early as practicable in the Spring; and it is contemplated to have the track completed about the 1st of November next,

In another column of to-days paper will be found an advertisement of the Engineer, for proposals for furnishing sills; and we are informed that in a few days proposals will be issued for one thousand Iron Coul Cers, capable of holding 5 tons each.

Oregon. Mr. Archison's Bill.-The object of this Bill is to take possession at once of the Oregon Territory, including the whole country lying

West of the Rocky Mountains to the Pacific Ocean, and between the parallels of 42 and 54 degrees, 40 minutes North latitude. It authorises the President to have erected a line of stockade and block-house forts, five in number, extending from some point on the Missouri to the best pass for entering the valley of the Oregon. Provision is also made by the bill for granting six hundred and forty acres of land to every inhabitant of Oregon, of the age of eighteen years and upwards, who shall cultivate and use the same for five consecutive years. The grant is upon the condition secured to him and his heirs. Every married man thus settling in the Territory is to receive an additional grant of one hundred and sixty acres for his wife, and

a like quantity for every child under eighteen. The bill has been referred to a select committee, composed of Mesers, Arcurson, Walk-ER, SEVIER, MERARCK and Puges. It is altogether likely that a favorable report will come from this committee,
