NEW HAMPSHIRE—The New Hampshire papers give the vote for Governor by which it appears that Jno. H. Steele, democrat, is elected by 2,500 majority over all competitors. The returns are not yet complete.

MARBLE IN YORK COUNTY—The York (Pa.) Republican says that a quarry of marble, which bears a fine polish and is handsomely variegated, has been opened in the vicinity of that borough.

AMERICAN IMPROVEMENTS IN MACHINERY—The New York Evening Post states that an ingenious artisan in Massachusetts has lately invented a method of making Marseilles quilts with a much facility as the common brown sheeting which costs nine cents a yard. A power loom driven by great regularity and symmetry, the raised figures on its surface exhibiting almost very imaginable variety of pattern. A little girl, or any inexperienced person may tend several looms at once. The price of the fabric can only exceed that of common brown sheeting by the cost of the material, inasmuch as the labor of producing it is no greater. The same person has invented a power loom for weaving ingrain carpets with the same rapidity that the looms of four stories turn out the plainest and coarsest fabrics. A certain rich capitalist at the eastward, is expended eighty thousand dollars in assisting an inventor in his various experiments to bring to perfection, which he has at length succeeded in doing. A little girl stands at the machine and tends four or five looms, which jerk out the finished fabric with incredible rapidity. As a principal expense of making this kind of carpeting has hitherto been the cost of the labor, the author will be greatly reduced by this invention. The fabric has been offered, the Post says, eighty thousand pounds for the patent right in England, but this, his obligations to the capitalist who furnished him with the means of bringing it to perfection, forbid him to accept.

A FURTHER SUPPLEMENT
To the act entitled "An Act relating to county rates and levies and township rates and levies," passed the 15th day of April, 1834.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that it shall be the duty of the Supervisors of the highways of every township and borough in the counties of Schuylkill, Northumberland, and Carbon, annually to select one of their number, or appoint some suitable inhabitant of the township or borough, to be collector of the Road taxes levied or assessed for such township or borough, which Supervisor or other person appointed collector, as aforesaid, shall give bond with two or more sufficient securities, to be approved by the Township or Borough Auditors, and deposited with them, which bond shall be in the name of such township or borough, and the condition thereof shall be that such collector shall well and truly collect and pay over to the Township or Borough Treasurer, if one be elected or appointed, and if not, then to the Supervisors, or account for, according to law, the whole amount of the taxes charged and assessed in the duplicate, delivered to such collector; Provided: That nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent all persons rated for road taxes from working out their respective taxes in the manner now provided by law.

SECTION 2. That it shall and may be lawful for the electors of every Township and Borough, in the counties of Schuylkill and Northumberland annually, at the time and place of electing Supervisors, to elect a Township or Borough Treasurer, who shall give such bond and perform such duties, and be subject to the like penalties, as are provided for in the ninety-fifth, ninety-sixth, ninety-seventh and ninety-eighth sections of an act of the fifth of April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, entitled "An act relating to Counties and Township and County and Township officers."

SECTION 5. That so far as any law as is hereby altered or supplied, be, and the same is hereby repealed.
